

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


Putting Learner's Needs First

- Flexibility
 - Varied options for class attendance based on time and needs (1- HS Schedule)
- Relevance
 - ► Choosing Topics: Interesting to the student (2 Cornell Notetaking PPT)
- Autonomy
 - Work at own pace and skill level (3 Rubrics)
 - Choose resources and medium (7 Everfi Online Courses)
 - ► Text, Video, Audio, Documentary, Lecture, Discussions, etc..)
- Connectedness
 - Advising and the Learning Plan (4 Learning Plan)
 - Extended Orientation go slow to go fast and increase retention (5 Orientation)
 - Opportunities to work in collaborative groups (6 Workshops)
 - Book Study, Math Tutorials, Current Events Discussion Groups)

Choosing Topics

- Interesting to You
 - If it is interesting to you, researching and learning about the topic will be more fun because it is something you want to learn.
- Relevant to the Subject
 - Content must be appropriate for the subject you are working on.
- Reliable Source
 - Watch out for bias and opinion! Scholarly sites are usually the best.
- Focused on an Essential Question*



Example Essential Questions

- How did slavery contribute to the American Civil War?
- How do plants use photosynthesis to grow and develop?
- What role does the President play in enacting new laws?
- How does the law of supply and demand impact consumers?
- Why is the sky blue?
