#### RE: CAEP FY 2024-25 Final Consortium Allocations

This memorandum is to advise local recipients and fiscal agents of adult education program funds on the release of the FY 2024-25 final CAEP allocations. You may access this <u>link</u> to view the final allocations schedule. The 2024-25 CAEP allocation increase from the May Revise is now available in NOVA as an allocation amendment. Consortium members will have until September 1, 2024, to submit and certify their amended allocation amounts in NOVA. The CAEP State Leadership and the Technical Assistance Provider (TAP) will offer a CAEP Allocation Amendment webinar on **Tuesday, July 30, 2024, from 11:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m.** to review the final allocation amounts, provide members with an overview of the NOVA process, and answer any questions. # **CAEP State Allocation Process**



Education Code mandates that the Chancellor's Office and CDE provide allocation schedules to the Department of Finance no later than July 15<sup>th</sup> annually.



Legislature requires the State to disburse CAEP funds within 45 days of the budget enactment. The disbursement is released in 11 installments through June of the program year.





# CAEP State Process (Cont'd.)

Allocation amounts for fiscal agents and direct funded members must be confirmed shortly after the State Budget is passed on July 1<sup>st</sup>. If the state legislature provides a COLA adjustment via the May Revise and/or the Trailer Bill – CAEP consortia and direct funded members will be asked to complete an allocation amendment by September 1<sup>st</sup>.





# REMINDER

The State has updated NOVA to reflect the amended amount **by consortium**.

Each consortium must enter and certify in NOVA the allocation amounts for their member agencies (by September 1<sup>st</sup>)

For direct funded members, amounts have already been determined (see link in the allocation memo). Must still be manually entered into NOVA.





# **CAEP** Allocation Process

Step 1	Preliminary Allocations released by February 28th
Step 2	Consortia certification via the CFAD by May 2nd
Step 3	May Revise (mid-May) and/or Trailer bill (late June) adjustment
Step 4	State submits CAEP schedules to DOF (July 15th)
Step 5	State begins CAEP fund disbursement (August 15th)
Step 6	Consortium members certify amendments (September 1st)

## Question?

How does the State CAEP Office confirm allocation amounts at the local district level while meeting the July 15<sup>th</sup> deadline imposed by the Department of Finance, if we don't need to certify our allocation amendment until September 1st?





# Response:

If there are any technical adjustments via the May Revise or the Trailer bill to the State Budget bill – the State will use the same funding formula to allocate funds to each consortium. This action will satisfy the need to have allocation amounts for consortia with fiscal agents. But.....







# Response (cont'd.):

....for direct funded members, the State will use the same proportional share that was approved via the CFAD on May 2<sup>nd</sup> to adjust the budget upward or downward (see example in the next few slides).

## Question?

If I'm a direct funded member, why is the State CAEP Office calculating this for me? My consortium wants to do other things with the increase?





## Response:

Members receive no less than the prior year's amount (unless it meets one of the three causes for a funding reduction). [EC 84914]

COLA means a cost-of-living increase for all member districts (which means all members in good standing will receive the COLA).

Fiscal agent and direct funded member allocation schedules are due to DOF by July 15<sup>th.</sup>

CAEP funds must be disbursed 45 days after the State Budget is signed.

If I'm a direct funded agency, where do I find my predetermined amounts for the allocation amendment?





## Response:

Direct funded members can find the link to the predetermined amounts in the CAEP allocation memo released July 11, 2024.

Note: If consortia wish to make changes with their 2024-25 allocations, they may do so via the allocation amendment process.

Please note, direct funded members must follow up locally to physically move/transfer funds among members.







# Reminders

□ AB 1491 Carryover compliance tracking is underway (start of FY 23-24)

- > First year of tracking will close once Q4 expenses are certified by **September 30, 2024**
- > Start date includes the tracking of both **member carryover** and **consortium carryover**
- AB 1491 authorizes the consortium to reduce a member's "excessive" carryover funding after two years of consecutive excessive carryover has been determined (EC 84914)
- Member carryover impacts consortia carryover
- Consortia exceeding 20% carryover annually will be monitored by the Chancellor's Office and CDE

#### Subject: AB 1491 Carryover Guidance

This memorandum provides guidance to California Adult Education Program (CAEP) consortia and their members on the requirements of <u>AB 1491</u> (carryover legislation). These requirements will go into effect during the **2023**-2024 program year.

MEMO

#### **Carryover Legislation**

#### A. MEMBER CARRYOVER

This bill authorizes a consortium to reduce a member's allocation by no more than the amount of the member's carryover, as defined, if the consortium makes a finding by a majority vote, based on the member having excessive carryover for at least two consecutive fiscal years beginning with the 2023–24 fiscal year, that the member has been consistently ineffective in providing services that address the needs identified in its adult education plan. There is no percentage threshold mandated in AB 1491 that is specific to member carryover, unless it is determined by the individual consortium.

#### B. CONSORTIUM CARRYOVER

The bill requires a consortium with carryover from **one or more prior fiscal years** exceeding 20% to submit a written expenditure plan, as specified, to the Chancellor and the Superintendent, and would require the Chancellor and the Superintendent to prescribe and assign technical assistance to that consortium to ensure effective use of funds as specified by existing policy, and that the consortium's annual carryover does not continue to exceed 20% to continue providing adequate adult education services to the region.

#### AB1491 Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ)

#### 1. What is carryover?

"Carryover" means the amount of unspent CAEP funds from the prior fiscal year, certified in NOVA on or before September 1 of the current fiscal year, expressed as a percentage of the prior fiscal year's allocation.

For example, if a member's allocation was \$500,000 each year, and they *carried over* \$250,000 into the current year giving them a total budget of \$750,000 then they would have a carryover of \$250,000 or 50% of their fiscal year's allocation. Another example would be if a member has carryover from multiple years: a member's allocation was \$500,000 each year, and they also had \$200,000 from the prior year, and \$50,000 from the year before that, then they would have a carryover of \$250,000 or 50% of their fiscal year's allocation.

Note: The carryover amount that may be reduced is a total amount covering multiple years, not a specific annual amount or percentage. The percentage is used only to determine if the carryover meets or exceeds the consortium determined excessive member carryover threshold.

#### 2. Is member carryover the same as consortium carryover?

No. Consortium carryover is **one** or more prior fiscal years exceeding 20% and is assessed and acted upon annually. Consortium carryover includes the carryover of all its members.

For example, a consortium receives \$8M a year with four members each receiving \$2M a year for a total of \$8M. When Q4 was certified in NOVA, the consortium had \$2M in carryover or 25% (2M divided by 8M). The carryover was made up of each member having \$500K in carryover (500K X 4 = 2M). This would exceed the consortium 20% threshold as called out in AB1491 legislation.

#### 3. What is excessive member carryover?

Excessive member carryover is not defined in the legislation. Therefore, each individual consortium may uniquely define "excessive member carryover" as a specific percentage of any unspent funds from the prior fiscal year. This percentage becomes that consortium's threshold for determining which members meet or exceed the excessive carryover.
